IT'S THAT time of the year again for all keen ocean swimmers to get out their bathers and goggles and enter the BE ACTIVE Novice Ocean Swim which is conducted annually by the Fremantle Masters Swimming Club in conjunction with their Fremantle Ports Swim Thru over 1600 metres. Both events will be held at South Beach, South Fremantle on Saturday 8 December 2012 commencing at 8.30am, although to register you will need to get there a bit earlier. The novice event, which is sponsored by Healthway under their BE ACTIVE health message, gets underway around 8.45am after the start of the main event.

Participants in the BE ACTIVE Novice Ocean Swim are encouraged to see the start of the 1600 metre event which they may possibly aspire to enter, sometime in the future.

Swimmers of all abilities are encouraged to participate in the 400 metre novice ocean swim which is supported by Have a Go News This shorter event is particularly aimed at beginner ocean swimmers. However any interested adult swimmers are encouraged to enter and 'have a go' at swimming in the ocean, in this well supervised and non-competitive event. The BE ACTIVE Novice Ocean Swim is not a race, although times will be provided if requested, and is ideal for swimmers who cannot vet manage the longer distances of

other open water swim events. Most importantly it is a fun event, so participants can enjoy a leisurely swim at their own pace over the course that is supervised by surf life-savers.

DIABETES WA will be lighting the Perth Bell Tower blue for World Diabetes Day on 14 November 2012.

Diabetes WA Chief Executive Officer, Mr Andrew Wagstaff, believes it is critical the impact diabetes has on the Western Australian community is continually highlighted.

"Diabetes is Australia's fastest growing chronic disease," said Mr Wagstaff.

"In Western Australia alone, there are more than 104,000 people diagnosed with diabetes. For every one of those, it is estimated there is another person at risk of having diabetes in the community who is unaware that they have the condition.

Computer use keeps seniors' brains in good working order

OLDER MEN who use a computer for email, browsing the Internet, word processing, games or social media have a 40 per cent lower risk of developing dementia than those who never or rarely use a computer.

That is the conclusion from an eight-year study by researchers at the University of Western Australia of more than 5500 men aged 65 to 85.

Professor Osvaldo Almeida, the lead author, is Research Director at the Centre for Health and Ageing.

"As the world's population ages, the number of people experiencing cognitive decline and dementia will increase to 50 million by 2025," he said. "But if our findings are correct, the increase in the number of cases of dementia over the next 40 years may not be as dramatic as is currently expected.'

Previous studies have shown that exercising your brain by activities such as crosswords and computer games decreases your risk of dementia. However there has been no published study of the effect of long term computer use.

"So it got us thinking, with personal computer ownership on the increase, could it make a difference? We found that it did, and that there was a significant benefit," he said.

Computer users tended to be younger than nonusers, have completed at least high school, and lead a more active social life. They are also less likely to show evidence of depression or poor physical health.

Computer use by seniors is growing rapidly. In Western Australia 47 per cent of over 60 year olds have a computer at home, compared to only 29 per cent six years ago. Others have access to a computer through libraries and some seniors' centres. More than 80 per cent of senior computer owners browsed the Internet or used email and chat sites. Half of

endocrine system, but none of them increase lifespan as much as has occurred in modern humans.

Little or none of this longer lifespan is due to changes in human genotype, because little selection could have taken place in only four generations.

The authors says the changes must be largely due to changes in the environment, such as better nutrition, healthcare and particularly reducing the effect of infectious disease at a younger age.

Most theories of ageing suggest that late-life mortality is determined by genetic errors that occur during cell division. It is thought that these deleterious mutations progressively accumulate with age

Dr Burger and his colleagues say this is difficult to reconcile with these observations of mortality. In fact the human genome appears to give humans a license to drastically reduce mortality by non-genetic change

The ability of humans to prolonged life is unprecedented. The authors say it is difficult to predict when this improvement will stop.

Perhaps there is no upper limit to the length of time humans can live.

them paid bills over the Internet.

The researchers found that the risk of dementia was up to 40 per cent lower among older computer users than non-users and that this was not due to differences in age, education, social isolation, depression, overall health or cognitive impairment.

There was also evidence that the more seniors used the computer the lower their risk of getting dementia.

Although no women participated in this study it is very likely that they too benefit from computer use. however computer use is less common amongst older women.

The researchers were not able to say if computer use prevents the disease process that leads to dementia or just delays the clinical onset of the disease.

Professor Almeida says older people should be encouraged to embrace computer technology as long as they understand the dangers of prolonged physical inactivity and the many advantages of a balanced, healthy and active lifestyle.

The research is part of Australia's longest-running longitudinal study of men's health and ageing. It has been following a group of more than 19,000 men since 1996.

The results were published in the journal PLoS-One.

I had a quintuple heart bypass 15 years ago and from then on [have] maintained average weight through a low-fat diet. I have kept my cholesterol to the prescribed level and exercised in a gym regularly.

Two years ago I suddenly needed two stents because of a blocked artery.

In hospital I confronted the doctors about why my artery became blocked after years of "correct living." Their

answer was 'we really don't know.

I was informed that the latest think-

ing was that cholesterol was no longer the villain but that free radicals were now under suspicion. (I thought these caused cancer).

So where are we to go from here? Often we read of recommendations by the medical profession worldwide about what to eat, what not to eat, to exercise, to cycle etc; yet my doctors had no answers.

Has anybody done a study on how long the medical experts live? That would be interesting!

Little and often is the drinking choice of retirement village residents

RETIREMENT village residents drink more often than seniors living elsewhere, but they don't go in for heavy drinking sessions. They drink less on each occasion than others of the same age group.

Those are the findings of a study by Drs Celia Wilkinson and Julie Dare of Edith Cowan University. They interviewed 42 residents between the ages of 65 and 74 and compared them to a similar aged group living in their own homes

The study found that social groups in retirement villages self-moderate their levels of drinking.

"Our quantitative analysis showed no meaningful difference between the amounts of alcohol consumed by the two groups," Dr Wilkinson said.

"However, the qualitative results indicated that living in a retirement village increases the frequency of alcohol consumption due to greater opportunities such as proximity and community events, and the removal of constraints such as having

limits to their intake: enough to facilitate socialisation, but not enough to impair mobility or put them at risk." Earlier this year, in a paper published in Psychological Science, University of Pitts-

burgh researchers found that moderate amounts of alcohol - consumed in a social setting - enhances positive emotions and social bonding and relieve negative emotions among those drinking.

They concluded that alcohol stimulates social bonding, increases the amount of time people spend talking to one another, and reduces displays of negative emotions.

In a long-term Canadian study of 5,400 middle-aged people, drinking alcohol in a consistent, responsible manner was linked to an overall improvement in health and well being. Subjects who kept their weekly consumption "sensible," also reported feeling happier and had fewer complaints compared to non-drinkers and former drinkers.

The researchers defined a sensible amount of alcohol as 21 standard (10g alcohol) drinks a week for men and 14 for women.

The Canadian researchers tracked health issues and subjects filled out questionnaires in order to quantify their overall emotional disposition. For example, the subjects reported how often they felt "so sad that nothing could cheer you up" and when "everything was an effort." The results were converted into a formula where 1.0 is perfectly healthy and 0.36 is high emotional disability

Moderate drinkers scored best at an average score of 0.89, while former drinkers

ranked last at 0.74. Nondrinkers ranked at 0.78 and heavy drinkers at 0.86.

The researchers conclude that moderate alcohol consumption did not have a measurable deleterious effect over time.

The study was published in a recent issue of the Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs.

Dr Dare said the ECU

study also raised questions about the effectiveness of safe drinking messages.


"Some participants believed that responsible drinking advertisements were more appropriate for a younger audience, and considered that in general, older drinkers had arrived at a drinking level that was appropriate for them," Dr Dare


said.

"As such, they tended to view mainstream safe drinking campaigns as somewhat patronising."

Current Australian government recommendations are not more than two standard drinks per day and not more than four on any one occasion.

ON 16 APRIL 2013 free-to-air analog TV will be switched off in the Perth area and local MLA John Hyde wants to ensure that eligible people get assistance for the changeover to digital from the Federal Government.

'From 16 April only digital signals will be transmitted for free-to-air TV. People on some Centrelink payments who also have a functioning TV are eligible for the Household Assistance Scheme," said Mr Hyde.

The Household Assistance Scheme provides a package of assistance that includes free:

• Easy to use digital equipment

• In-home installation and demonstration

• 12 months aftercare support and equipment warranty If you can receive ABC2, ABC3 or SBS TWO you already

have a TV capable of receiving digital broadcasts. "The Scheme provides a safety net for people who cannot convert without assistance. An Australian Government engaged contractor will visit your home and help you get ready for the switch over by installing free digital equipment.

The installer will check your reception and if you need satellite TV all equipment will be installed free-of-charge,' Mr Hyde said.

Eligible households must be on the full rate of an Age or Disability Support Pension, Carer Payment, Veterans' Affairs Service Pension or Veteran Affairs Income Support Supplement. Talking set-top boxes will also be available for people who receive an eligible pension and are legally blind, or are the carer of a child who is registered as legally blind.

"Don't wait until closer to the date, get in early so that your installation is carried out before switchover and you do not lose access to free-to-air TV," said Mr Hyde.

"Call 1800 556 443 or go to www.digitalready.gov.au for any queries you have about the switch over and your eligibility for this great Federal Government initiative," he said.





Army Museum Kokoda Track display

LAST MONTH, the new World War II Gallery was opened at the Army Museum by the Governor of Western Australia, Malcolm McCusker, AC, CVO in the presence of many dignitaries who included the director of the Australian Army History Unit, Mr Roger Lee, the Member for Fremantle Melissa Park, MP, the Mayor of the City of Fremantle, Dr Brad Pettit, and former politician and Vietnam veteran Graham Edwards, AM.

Other guests included representatives of ex-service organisations and also Army service personnel who were represented by the Commander of the 13th Infantry brigade, Brigadier Steve Coggin.

Many members of the Army Museum of WA Foundation were also guests at the opening including Bill Jamieson and his wife Norma, both of whom are

Honorary Life Members of the Army Museum of WA

Foundation. This outstanding display covers the entire period of the Australian Army's commitment in the Second World War from the declaration of war in Europe in 1939 until the Japanese surrender in 1945.

Completed over a two year period at a cost of more than \$500,000, it is regarded as equal in its professional design and layout to any commercially constructed museum gallery in Australia

The entire design was created by the volunteers of the Gallery Design Committee under the guidance of the Museum Curator, Mr Robert Mitchell.

Input was sought from the more than 120 volunteers who serve at the museum on a regular basis. Hundreds of hours were

spent by volunteers in as-

sembling the numerous displays and exhibits.

The campaigns highlighted range from the opening hours of the war in Europe, Greece and Crete, the Western Deserts (Tobruk and El Alamein) and on to Libya and Syria.

The impact of the war on the home front in Australia is also profiled as is the fighting in Malaya and the Battle for Singapore.

The tragic story of the independent forces based at Rabaul and on Ambon and in Portuguese Timor is followed by an impressive floor to ceiling diorama of the Kokoda Track and the fierce fighting that led to the ultimate victory in Papua and New Guinea.

The campaigns in the islands of the South West Pacific; along the north coast of New Guinea and on to Borneo are dramatically revealed, as are the activities of the secretive 'Z' Force. The Second World War

Gallery is a fitting tribute to the men and women of the Australian Army who served our nation and the British Empire against the Germans, Italians and the Japanese.

As the years pass, few Second World War veterans remain, but the gallery will serve to ensure that they will not be forgotten.

Being Barker

NO SEX please we're British! Or should that read 'no sex please, you're old enough to know better'?

High Court Judge Michael Kirby speaking in Melbourne at a world congress on adult guardianship recently highlighted the issue of how difficult it is to accommodate the sexual desire of older people and even somewhat controversially suggesting that aged care facilities were actively discriminating against older people by restricting opportunities for sexual intimacy with their partners.

Children of nursing home residents were quoted as being extremely uncomfortable with the thought that their parents or grandparents

harboured any such thoughts along those lines. There appears to be an unspoken prejudice if not structural barriers, in many aged discourage sexual intimacy

for residents. Now this may seem a little uncomfortable topic for discussion, particularly since I can recall being horrified at the thought that my parents who appeared to be very old at the time (they must have been in their late 30s) actually had sex to conceive me!

Not only that, I figured out that they must have had to do it three times as I had two sisters. But let's try to put my psychological trauma to one side for a moment and recognise that even in the most difficult of circumstances, to quote Former High Court Judge Kirby, "the autonomy and dignity of the human individual, including in their sexual expression, survives . . . even into dementia."

Yes, it appears that the cat is out of the bag; older people do have sex.

Sorry kids but its true and as a baby boomer myself, I really don't want my parents or grandparents to feel like guilty adolescents sneaking off for a bit of nookie.

Equally I really don't want to know the details either but if growing older means for me that I am going to be denied the opportunity for sexual intimacy with my partner just because I am in aged care, or because society finds the thought repulsive, then I have another expression that many baby boomers will be familiar with and that's "Bad luck," or words to that effect.

We don't need constant exposure to sex in advertising, sex in supermarkets, in newspapers and other main stream media to know that's it's a natural part of being human, a way of sharing the most intimate connection with our partners but equally as baby boomers we don't need our children or grandchildren judging us either.

I realise that such comments will attract feedback from readers who feel that even writing about it here is unnecessary but if our sexual expression is to survive then we need to say to the architects that design aged care facilities and care givers that we value so highly, how about building into the design and training of staff, some appreciation of the fact that we are going to want to have dignity and sexual expression as we age and we are not prepared to be judged or be made to feel like naughty adolescents sneaking off behind the bike sheds, appealing though that may be to some.

COINS with Mickel Smits

A FIELD of Australian coin collecting I find most fascinating are tokens, particularly tradesman's tokens.

Tokens are a form of 'unofficial' currency which is redeemable at, for example, sporting clubs, amusement centres and business houses.

During the mid 1800s there was an acute shortage of the low denomination coinage, pennies and halfpennies throughout the Australian Colonies, especially NSW and Victoria where the populations were the largest. In fact, the availability of sufficient currency had up until then been a constant problem since the establishment of the penal colony at Sydney Cove in 1788.

The First Fleet brought little currency with them; there was hardly much need. In time, free settlers arrived.

Commerce of the day was principally conducted by barter, promissory notes and rum currency.

In 1880 a shipment of copper coins arrived from England; in 1813 a large quantity of Spanish-American dollars were purchased and transformed into the now famous

Holey Dollars and Dumps; then in 1825 a further shipment of English silver coins arrived. Foreign coins also formed part of the colonial currency as they were introduced by sea-faring traders passing through.

By the mid 1800s the population and commerce had progressively expanded but then exploded with the discovery of gold in Victoria in 1851. Consequently there was plenty of gold about but little copper coinage essential for small daily transactions. The authorities were caught out so local merchants took the initiative and began commissioning the production of principally penny, but also halfpenny, token coins that could not only be transacted in their stores but universally

throughout the community. Heaton and Sons of Birmingham, England who produced coins for England were commissioned by Melbourne grocers Annand and

Smith to produce pennies. In Sydney, the local medallist and die sinking firm, J.C Thornthwaite, produced pennies and halfpennies for the tea and coffee merchants, Peek and Campbell. Then, back in Melbourne where the immediate need was greatest, the medallists Thomas Stokes and W.J Taylor set about meeting the demand with imported machinery. Henderson's tokens which

Over the forthcoming years almost 500 different copper tokens were mass produced for a vast array of merchants, including drapers, tailors, haberdashers, ironmongers, wine and spirit suppliers, booksellers, stationers, tobacconists, shoe and boot makers, coach builders, bakers, confectioners, wholesalers and importers, general stores, pawnbrokers, and even the medallists and die sinkers who produced them, also issued their own editions.

The tokens not only facilitated the need for small change, they also served as an advertising and marketing medium for the merchants who had their tokens designed to incorporate their trading name, address and type of business if not also images relating to their trade. In WA only two businesses

In WA only two busilesses issued penny tokens. Ironically they were pawnbrokers, Alfred Davies of High St and John Henderson of Packenham Street, who traded in Fremantle at a time when it was spelled 'Freemantle'.

The tokens were Davies' design, featured a black swan and are scarcer than



August 1975 saw the enormous increase in the cost of a standard letter rate from 10 cents to 18 cents, so Australia Post hit upon the Christmas Card concession to appease the unhappy public. The 15 cent stamp of shepherds viewing the crib was well received. The concession was not, at that time, extended to cards destined for overseas addresses.

By Christmas 1978 the letter rate had risen to 20 cents but the CARD ONLY rate remained at 15 cents. There was no standard letter rate stamp in the Christmas set that year. The 25 cent Virgin & Child stamp catered for non-standard envelopes. This made the 25 cent stamp appropriate for the larger Christmas cards. It is now quite a challenge for a collector to find either of these stamps still gracing their original envelopes.

In 1981, the concession increased to 6 cents and in 1983 it dropped back to only 3 cents but the concept of the CARD ONLY Christmas discount has continued. From 1999 onwards the Christmas concession was extended to international mail.

As we come to the end of 2012 it is appropriate to congratulate the Philatelic Society of Western Australia on serving the hobby for 100 years.

The society was created at a meeting of philatelists at the Palace Hotel, Perth on 5 December 1912. In recent years the Society which owns its own premises at Wellington Fair, Lord St, East Perth, offers members a choice of six or more meetings a month for differing branches of the hobby.

We will long remember the magnificent Centenary Exhibition hosted in May this year by PSWA at Claremont Showgrounds. It certainly was the finest display of our hobby ever to be staged in Western Australia, a credit to all who took part in its organisation.

Retirement village residents miss out on electricity rebate

RETIREMENT VILLAGE residents are likely to miss out on government benefits aimed at offsetting higher electricity costs.

The WA government has agreed to pay a cost of living allowance to Synergy and Horizon customers who are holders of a WA Seniors card, Commonwealth Seniors Health Card, a Centrelink health care card or Department of Veteran's Affairs gold card.

The allowance will be nearly \$150 this financial year and \$200 in a full year. It will replace the existing supply charge rebate currently worth \$147 a year.

In multiple residences, lifestyle villages and strata units, where the electricity is supplied through one main electricity meter, each additional residence with a subsidiary meter is charged a supply charge.

 Residents who provided their concession card details to Synergy, were automatically entitled to receive the payment. This was sent as a six monthly electronic funds
 transfer paid directly into their bank account.

However this does not apply to the new cost of living allowance (CoLA).

Electricity retailers sell electricity to whole retirement villages, lifestyle villages and strata companies, which in most cases resell it to residents via sub-meters in individual units.

Synergy argues that retirement home residents are not its customers and retirement villages themselves are not eligible under the terms of the concession as they are commercial clients.

That means that around 21,000 pensioners will probably miss out.

Rob Waite National Seniors Project Officer has been actively pursuing this anomaly on behalf of both the National Seniors Association and the Western Australian Residential Complexes Residents Association.

The Hon Peter Collier, Minister for Energy, in a letter to Mr Waite said:

"...energy retailers have no control as to how retirement villages bill their residents for electricity (therefore) they are currently unable to provide concessions through this mechanism."

He suggested that retirement village managements could supply Seniors Card and Concession Card numbers to Synergy, which could then credit the relevant allowance to the village accounts.

It would then be up to the individual villages to pass on the savings to residents.

Mr Waite points out that all villages – by law – must have Residents' Committees that monitor the internal finances of each village.

"This is in effect, a selfauditing process to ensure against any misfeasance or fraud. This existing governance system prevents any imputation of impropriety on the part of operators of residential facilities." he said.

M Andrew Wadle, MLA for Forrestfield raised the matter in a grievance debate in the Legislative Assembly last month.

Replying on the behalf of the government Dr Mike Nahan, parliamentary secre-

tary to the Minister for Energy pointed out that not all electricity sold to retirement villages is used by residents.

Mr Waite said the Public Utilities Office is looking at ways of ensuring that pensioners in retirement homes do not miss out on CoLA payments.

He said retirement villages could themselves solve the problem by changing the metering system so that individual units were metered direct. However there would be some capital cost in making this change.

While the government dithers, some 20,000 pensioners are without any assistance with electricity cost that has increased by 67 per cent in the past two years.

Four volunteers ring 350 people a month to check on their health and wellbeing and to have a chat. The volunteers look for problems and arrange a home visit or notify Silver Chain if anything appears to be amiss, such as getting an answering machine rather than a real person when they call.

Telephone volunteer Ann Hannan has been on call every Wednesday for over

She gets a mixed reaction to her calls. "Some people are very lonely, others love to talk, and often their families live away.

"One lady had ostracised her family. She had refused to speak to them for seven years. They weren't even allowed to knock on her door. I visited her and was able to bring the family back together. Now a daughter is back in her life just as she needs help.

"We also arranged home help and discovered that she had fractured her spine.

"We are able to identify specific needs. One man had been trying to get a wheelchair for his wife for 12 months. We were able to get it to her that day," she said

Skilled callers can also provide early warning of possible dementia.

To get a call seniors either register themselves or are nominated by their families as wanting regular contact.

All people on the register received an invitation to a Christmas in July afternoon tea from the City and a Christmas function is planned for November. A primary school choir of 50 children will entertain the seniors.

The program's main problem is to identify people in need of the service.

The Social Connect Program is funded by the Social Innovation Grant Program of the WA Department for Communities.

In addition the City coordinate the largest Neighbourhood Watch program of any local government organisation in WA with over 250 volunteers, but the Social Connect program could use a few more volunteer callers.

Vince Garreffa's **Chicken and Pinenut Filo Pie**

PREPARE this Morrocan filling with pinenuts from Europe and filo from Australia to make a great pie. Fabulous fare as the weather warms up and easy to keep for leftovers.

Ingredients for 4 big eaters!

- 350g small diced skinless chicken thighs
- 4 cups of finely diced Spanish onion
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup pinenuts (toasted) • 50g freshly chopped coriander
- 1 level teaspoon ginger powder
- 2 level teaspoons cinnamon powder
- 9 sheets filo pastry 25cm x 40 cm size
- 100g melted salted butter
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 teaspoon of nutmeg
- 50 ml Extra Virgin Olive Oil (EVOO)
- Salt and Pepper
- 1 x 24cm spring form baking pan

Method:

IN A LARGE non-stick frypan, fry the onion with the EVOO until a little coloured. Add the chicken, ginger, cinnamon and salt and pepper to taste, stirring well. Then put a lid on the pan and cook at medium heat lifting the lid to stir every five minutes until the chicken is cooked through. Now remove the lid and stir and cook constantly till the mix is a little dry with no juices bubbling, and only oil in the bottom. Remove from the heat and add the fresh coriander and pinenuts, mixing well. Now cool the filling

while you prepare your filo. With a pastry brush, paint the inside of your tin with melted butter, then lay one sheet of filo into the tin and paint it with melted butter, pushing it into the shape of the tin with the brush. Do also paint the filo that hangs out of the tin. Repeat this procedure with six sheets, criss-crossing each sheet and painting each one totally with the melted butter (melt more butter if you need to). Now fill the cavity in the

tin with the mixture and fold all the excess bits inwards to cover the top. Cut two filo rounds the same size as the top of the tin and paint each of them and press on the top of the pie. Then cut the last sheet 3cm wider where possible and without painting it, lay it on top and poke the excess down the sides of the pie to hold everything together. Now paint the top with the egg yolk and sprinkle it with the nutmeg. Bake at 175°C for 45 minutes, then rest with the oven turned off and the oven door ajar for an extra 10-20 minutes. Cut into wedges and serve hot and yummy.

When selecting, look for roots that are a bright red and free of cracks or spots and green leaves that are fresh and crisp. Combine diced radish with avocado and lime juice for a differently spicy salsa.

CAULIFLOWER: Beautiful and well-priced cauliflowers from the south west have tight snowy white heads that are an excellent source of vitamin C, particularly when served raw. Try them broken into tiny florets as a substitute for cabbage in your favourite coleslaw recipe, or steam or grill and dress with a mixture of good extra virgin olive oil, mustard and fresh herbs.

LOCAL PURPLE GARLIC: New season dewy-skinned fresh garlic is available from selected stores for a few weeks. Purple garlic is easy to peel, has the taste of real garlic and, best of all, is WA grown. Roast whole bulbs and spread the creamy flesh over crisp golden vegetables or stud a piece of lamb with garlic slivers, to allow the flavour to permeate the meat

EARLY STONEFRUIT: Be ready to catch the first waves of the season's stonefruit. Fragrant peaches and nectarines are starting to arrive and bringing with them the promise of long,

HEAT A LARGE non-stick frying pan over high heat until hot. Add oil and mushrooms and cook, stirring often, for 5 minutes or until mushrooms tender. Remove from heat. Set aside for 10 minutes. Drain excess liquid. Combine parsley, onion, garlic and spices in a food processor. Process until finely chopped. Add the mushrooms and mince, use the pulse button to proc-ess until well combined. Season with salt and pepper. Use wet hands to mould heaped tablespoons of mixture around eight metal skewers, squeezing the mixture tightly. Place on a tray. Cover and refrigerate for 30 minutes if time permits. Preheat barbecue plate on medium-high. Spray the skewers with oil, turning to coat all sides.





The history of cruising and ocean trave

IT IS ALMOST impossible to imagine a world without cruise ships.

Today, there are hundreds of cruise ships that carry thousands of passengers to exotic and romantic destinations across the globe.

For the majority of human history the ship was a vessel designed purely for transport. Ships relied mostly on sails for propulsion and were largely at the mercy of the winds. This began to change with the first steamships built for ocean going travel.

The first purpose built transatlantic steamship was designed by famed architect and inventor Isambard Kingdom Brunel.

Great Western was launched in 1838 with the intention of operating steam powered transatlantic crossings for her owner, the Great Western Steamship Company.

The steamship, powered by coal, which created steam to drive two large paddle wheels, was designed to complete the voyage using steam alone. She also carried auxiliary sails to provide extra power when the

winds were favourable. Her successful transatlantic crossings proved that steamships could successfully transit large bodies of ocean and began a race for supremacy on the North Atlantic between the powers in Britain, the United States, Germany and France.

As liners grew in size and speed over the following decades, steamship companies began to introduce new amenities for their passengers and began competing with each other for passengers by offering new luxuries previously unheard of at

Ships became ever more powerful, with large reciprocating engines and turbines that drove up to four propellers and moved the ships at speeds of more than 30 knots (55 km/hr). In fact, the fastest ever ocean liner. United States, achieved a top speed of more than 40 knots (74 km/ hr) during sea trials, a shipping speed record that remains unbroken to this day!

As these great ships were the only reliable connection between continents (container ships having not yet been invented) they were also required to carry large amounts of cargo. Large holds forward and aft of the superstructure led to vast storage areas where all sorts of goods were carried. As such, their forward and aft deck areas were often cluttered with cranes and hatches to load and unload this valuable cargo when in port.

These ships were not designed for pleasure cruising, but rather for the transportation of people and cargo. Their interiors were divided into distinct areas and strictly segregated according to class. First and second class passengers enjoyed sweeping promenade decks, vast public rooms and cabins with portholes and, in some cases, a private bathroom. People travelling here rubbed shoulders with the elite and often shared this part of the ship with celebrities, billionaires and royalty.

Poorer passengers and immigrants, who were travelling in steerage (third class), were berthed in small spaces, sometimes with up to 10 people to a cabin. This was by far the most profitable and populous passenger class, and mass immigration to the United States drove a boom in transatlantic passenger travel

Speed was of the essence, and the crossings were quick.

As with passengers on an aircraft today, those aboard the ocean liners wanted to get to their destination as fast as possible. Even those in first class preferred a speedy crossing. The trip was not a holiday but rather a necessity. It was the only way to travel. However, this changed in 1887

when The North Company (Scotland) launched the St. Sunniva. She is widely regarded as the world's first purpose built cruise ship. Very different from her transatlantic liner predecessors, St. Sunniva was built for pleasure voyages. One hundred passengers were berthed, all in first class, with no segregation onboard.

As St. Sunniva was designed for cruising, she had no cargo capacity, which freed up space aboard for passenger use, as the cranes, storage and machinery was not needed aboard the ship

Furthermore, she was a much slower ship than the liners, as her voyages were long, pleasure trips, there was no rush.

She had a nice array of passenger amenities, such as a ladies' lounge and gentleman's smoking room and bar. The vast areas of uncluttered deck space were perfect for passengers to sunbathe and view the exotic cruising destinations that the ship visited during her voyage.

Those lucky enough to be able to take voyages aboard St. Sunniva were able to visit British, Baltic and Mediterranean destinations.

Other lines soon copied The North Company and commissioned their own cruise ships which opened up new destinations to the travelling public.

From this early start, cruise ships had a slow and gradual increase in popularity.

Next month's article will trace how the great transatlantic liners were used for cruising during hard financial times, as well as their eventual collapse with the rise of the jet aircraft, which in turn paved the way to the rise of the modern cruise ship.

ernism an artistic rebellion against the status quo of the time With that theme in mind

this month, I hope to draw on the ideas contained in that exhibition to promote an alternative to the oversubscribed season's greetings

With the months of November and December usually dedicated to Christmas advertising, Christmas songs and Christmas 'bloody' shopping, I will focus on an alternate to the norm; you might say a 'subversive London Calling Christmas.

Be assured though, this isn't a 'Grinch that stole Christmas' situation and to lighten the mood I will start with a "spoon full of sugar" to help the medicine go down ...

The Chocolate Festival returns to Southbank Centre for its ninth gastronomic celebration of all things chocolate from Friday 7 – Sunday 9 December. Some of the most high profile chocolatiers and pastry chefs in the world will



converge for tutored tasting sessions and chocolate semi-

Paul Wayne Gregory, who specializes in innovative flavourings like caramel combined with sea salt, is one person whose products I will be seeking out. French chocolate company Valrhona will be hosting a Chocolate Afternoon Tea with treats like Dulcey pannacotta and crunchy spiced lollipops all served with Teas matched by the Rare Tea Company, or you can learn about 'Slow Chocolate' in a tutored tasting with 'Seventy%' who's mission statement reads: "we want to create an understanding of what fine chocolate should taste like and how it should be enjoyed" - I am so ready to learn and entry to the event is free!

For entertainment: first I look to innovative East London Theatre Company '1927' for The Animals and Children Took to the Streets. Set in a fictitious social housing block called Bayou Mansions on the edge of 'a' big city, child pirates go on a rampage reclaiming the city from the middle classes. Eerily the story echoes the company's own home in East London which has seen massive gentrification as the 'cool' push real estate prices up and the

Olympic developments further compound the social pressure.

The innovation lies in how the company weaves live music performance, film and animation to add colour and candour to the narrative capitalising on a method called 'video mapping' which is transforming objects and shapes into a projection by creating a virtual model of the surface. The method has seen huge proliferation in performance art with even the likes of pop sensation Beyonce using it in live shows. The Guardian newspaper called it, "A jawdroppingly clever and gloriously subversive parable" fitting in nicely with the flavour of this month's column.

Playing at the National's Lyttelton Theatre 12 December 2012 - 10 January 2013, ticket prices vary with standing tickets starting as low as £5 so I recommend you check the website: nationaltheatre. org.uk.

And back by popular de-mand at the Camden Roundhouse (my old stomping ground) is *Fuerzabruta* from 27 December. Created and directed by Diqui James this postmodernist performance show which originated in Buenos Aires, capitalises on fantastic visual effects and is described as a 360-degree performance (perhaps why the Roundhouse is its London home).

So far I have only been privy to preview clips and am still trying to make heads of the spectacle; one feature is a now iconic image of a man bursting full throttle through a series of moving walls and that is just part of the visual madness that makes up the show. Tickets Thurs 27 and Fri 28 December: £30, Sun & Tues - Thurs: £35 Fri and Sat: £39.50, and do note it is a standing show.

Just two spectacular theatre features for you this month both of which I am very, very excited about.

And for art, I head to the Victoria & Albert Museum exhibition: Light from the Middle East, the first major museum exhibition of Middle Eastern (ME) Contemporary photography, possibly a re-sponse to what is seen as the under-representation of ME photography in UK collections

The exhibition has more than 90 artists such as Abbas who is credited with some of the most evocative images of the Iranian revolution ('78-

79). Or the daring Mehraneh Atashi who defied women being forbidden inside the zourkhaneh (all-male Iranian gymnasium) gaining member's trust and cleverly using reflection to insert her own image into the photographs. Gender politics do take centre stage in some artist's works but there seems to be an underlying responsibility to reflect on the devastation that war causes.

Newsha Tavakolian's Mothers of Martyrs is a haunting reminder as she captures elderly mothers with framed pictures of their sons killed in the Iran-Iraq war ('80-'88).

And being an occasional 'scenester' in London's hangouts a favourite of mine is Hassan Hajjaj who after graduating from London's fashion and music scene moved back to Morocco and cultivated a style that mixes street culture with European stereotypes of the North African world. For striking portraiture and Technicolor Youssef Nabil's contemporary images reflecting the golden age of Egyptian cinema in the 1940s and 50s (known as 'Hollywood on the Nile') are haunting and glamorous. Part of the exhibition is aimed at demonstrating how "photography can be used as a powerful tool for recording people, places and events' something all us mere mortals could perhaps be mindful of when we shy from the camera or forget to document how quickly the young grow older.

And in closing; last month espoused the virtues of Loserville a new West End play at the Garrick Theatre which I can best describe as a cross between TV series Glee and The Big Bang Theory but set on stage in the 70s. It was a clever camp show with plenty of era specific jokes and issues: for instance the female lead wants to be the first women on the moon but is scorned causing her to quote Germaine Greer. The choreography was sensational and perhaps partly in homage to a TV programme, the performers show the opening and closing credits on stage. Most enjoyable was the Star Wars references throughout and somewhat clichéd Star Trek quotes. All in all an enjoyable watch with great performances from the cast - Loserville really isn't such a bad place.

The long dresses are heavy and reflect the style of the Victorian period with numerous petticoats worn to add fullness to their skirts. The dresses are hand-sewn by the women, who add their own personal style and flair.

Wearing the dresses often symbolizes a woman's place in the society.

The outfits are regarded as proper dress for traditional married wom-

By wearing the long dress, a newly married woman shows her in-laws that she is willing to take up the responsibilities of a wife.

The hats worn by Herero women represent the horns of cattle, which are the symbol of wealth to the Here-

The women showed no sign of being bothered by wearing the outfits, even in Namibia's hot dry semi-desert climate. However one selling dolls at a roadside stall in the Brandenburg Mountains admitted

she did not dress like that at home.

The Herero and Himba people are a pastoral, cattle-breeding tribe who migrated to Namibia several centuries ago. Around 150 years ago, the two groups split and Herero settled in towns and villages while the Himba continued with a pastoral lifestyle.

The traditional Herero live in the north of the country in the Kunene region and the Damaraland area.

Herero women take enormous pride in their outfits and have also developed a sideline in making and selling dolls wearing exact replicas of the dresses to tourists.

NATIONAL **ETOSHA** Park in northern Namibia has almost the whole range of large African game from five tonne bull elephants to tinv dik-dik antelopes. This includes 114 mammals, 340 birds, 100 reptiles, 16 amphibians and one fish species.

The park, declared in 1907, is a 4,800 square km depression which fills with water only rarely, and is surrounded by semi-arid savannah. Vast herds of animals graze in the grasslands and go to one of the several waterholes to drink.

These also attract predators - lions, leopards, cheetahs, hyenas and jackals.

On our first day we saw mountain zebras, ostriches, elephants and giraffes.

When the elephants came down to drink the other animals kept a safe distance. The giraffes spend much of their time watching from on high; when they drink they spread their legs in an ungainly fashion so their long necks can

reach the water. The following morning we were woken early by a lion's roar, which at first we thought was a rhino.

At dawn we travelled into the park on our safari vehicle spotting herds of zebras, the omnipresent springboks, giraffes, distant elephants, oryx, ground squirrel, mongoose, and various birds.

We saw three lions hiding in the undergrowth and later move to shade across the road. A pride of seven mature lions and lionesses crossed the road not five metres from our vehicle.

We came across more herds of elephants, some with young at foot and others consisting of bachelor groups of bulls.

And yes, elephants do have good memories. One bull, offended by a visitor in a Toyota has taken to charging whenever he saw a Toyota, but ignores other makes of vehicle. After a siesta we returned

for an evening drive, seeing more zebras, impala and wildebeests.

At a waterhole an adolescent bull elephant, in "must" (season), walked towards us in the vehicle. We were told to keep very quiet. As we did so the elephant pondered his next move. He decided to turn away only five metres from our safari wag-

could easily have upended our vehicle. At the same waterhole we witnessed a fierce fight between two male zebras. They are vicious with their kicking and biting at opponent's necks and not letting

just watching them. The following day we left Okaukuejo for Namutoni on the eastern side of the salt pan. There we saw secretary birds, more giraffes including young foals, hartebeests (antelopes with heads resembling horses), more lions, kudu, hyena, bustards, more elephants and vet more

Our guide spotted two adult cheetahs that appeared

group of springbok working their way through the dry grass. Once they wandered within 50 metres, the cheetahs changed to hunt mode. One became the stalker while the other kept back. Then there was a sudden burst of speed as the stalker rushed at the springbok. Within seconds the springbok was downed by the first cheetah and the second came in to finish the kill. cats, hunt during the daytime. They are built for short bursts of high speed, but are unable to defend themselves against other predators. Consequently, when they kill they go for internal organs which are higher in fat and progress onto the haunch, eating as much as they can, as quickly as they can, before the lions or hyenas arrive.

Half an hour later we found a female leopard under a tree not more than three metres from the safari wagon.

Later that evening we found a couple of mature lions relaxing (totally) around the waterhole while the giraffes stood by with worried expressions, not daring to drink in case the lions fancied another meal.

We have all seen African animals in the zoo, but it is not until you have seen them in the wild, up close, doing their thing, that you realise the might and beauty of the beasts.

Staying healthy on your trip to Africa



HAVING had a taste of Africa as a medical student spending time in Zambia and Zimbabwe, I can tell you that the memory of its vibrant colours, breathtaking vistas and amazing wildlife lasts for a lifetime.

A vast and magnificent continent, each African country needs individual consideration when it comes to staying healthy and the risk of disease for tourists is very dependent on specific itinerary and planned activities.

The African continent is home to many illnesses and not everyone will be exposed to them all but there are some that are worth highlighting.

Yellow Fever is a mosquito borne disease, vaccination against which is a requirement for entry into many countries including Australia. The vaccine is highly effective and provides 10 years immunity but not all doctors are licensed

to prescribe it. The risk versus benefit of vaccination needs to be carefully assessed and can depend on itinerary, medical history and

Africa also has the highest transmission rates for malaria in the world.

With careful mosquito avoidance and antimalarial medication however, the risk can be reduced significantly.

Safari visits are usually high on everyone's agenda and as they often take place at dusk and dawn, are of especially high risk for malaria as this is when mosquitos are at their most active.

Other common activities in Africa with related health issues include walking safaris and tick bites, altitude sickness climbing Mounts Kenya and Kilimanjaro and schistosomiasis (Bilharzia) from swimming in lakes.

Since medical care in Africa can be quite variable it is also often recommended to be self-sufficient and carry medication with you.

When it comes to staying healthy on your trip to Africa a visit to a travel health specialist for careful discussion of your travel plans, medical history and vaccine requirements is highly advisable and in some instances a must.



The Himba people

IT CAN BE embarrassing to gawp at people in a native village. But, there is no need when it is the last traditional tribe in Namibia, the Ova-Himba.

The Himba people live in a village near Kamanjab in northern Namibia in the same way as their ancestors have

done for thousands of years, but they also charge a fee for gawping. It was a strange experience

Living the "tradition

viewing and photographing people as if they were in a zoo. But it has economic benefits to the tribe – they use the funds to educate the children at some loss of dignity.

<u>let's go travelling</u>

The village consists of around 30 women and about one dozen men with children of all ages. They live in a dozen or so huts which are arranged in a circle with a central livestock corral. The pre-school children

made the most of the visitors by insisting on being picked up; swung between adult arms and generally being made a

fuss of. One of the Himba urchins took to clinging onto my walking stick and rubbing ochre off onto my trousers!

The hairstyle indicates age

and social status. Children have two plaits of braided hair. Older unmarried girls wear a forward pointing plait over the face

Married women coat themselves with a mixture of red ochre and butterfat, which is said to symbolise the richness of soil and blood and probably acts as a sun block. Their hair is in plaits reinforced with fat and sometimes plastic hair extensions. They wear animal skins around the waist and beaded anklets to protect their legs from animal bites.

Single men wear one plait backwards to their necks, while married men wear a turban of many ochre and butterfat soaked plaits.

Both married and unmarried women care for the chil-

dren, often unrelated to them. Women do most of the labour intensive work such as water carrying and house building. while men and boys tend the animals

Each family occupies a thatched hut with mud walls and a ramshackle wooden door. Internally the hut is divided into a left (male) and right (female and children) side although women may enter the male side.

Each hut has only one wooden pillow, which is often a family heirloom. The male has the pillow, while the wife traditionally sleeps on her husband's arm. The purpose of the elevated pillow is to make it easier to hear at night - important in the case of attacks on livestock.

Elephant Paradise

One young lady showed us her daily toilet ritual. She first smoked herself with camphor causing her to sweat, next she rubbed on butter mixed with another herb and finally, ochre.

Only young babies are bathed in water – ochre mixed with butter is normally used for cleansing.

A Himba man may have several wives – each with a separate hut and cattle. Our guide felt one wife was best – a departure from tradition.

The tribe's economy is based on cattle and goats. Calves and goats are kept in a corral over night while the cows are sent out to graze. Come morning the goats are sent out to graze and the cows rush into the corral to feed their calves.

Cows generally have one

milk the other teats into a plastic bucket and hence into gourds for human food. The Himba worship a single god Mukuru. Each family has its own ancestral fire, which is kept by the fire-keeper. The fire-keeper approaches the ancestral fire every seven to eight

can only manage one teat at

ONE OF Africa's 'must sees' is Chobe National Park, named for a river which rises in Angola, crosses the Caprivi strip in Namibia and eventually joins the Zambezi in Zimbabwe.

Chobe is the oldest National Park in Botswana. The 1.7 million hectare park is home to 100,000 elephants not to mention countless hippopotamuses, crocodiles, giraffes, Cape buffaloes, antelopes and many species of birds. It is also the most visited Park, probably because it is a bare 65km from

The Chobe elephant population is the densest in Africa and is probably the largest single surviving elephant population. Since 1990 numbers have built up from only a few thousand. The elephants living on

you.

the verdant floodplains of the Chobe are spoilt in comparison to the desert elephants of Namibia.

The best way to see elephants and hippos is on a river cruise. We saw elephants in small herds grazing on lush buffalo grass and then swimming across the river as night fell and they headed home. Sometimes only the tips of their trunks - acting as snorkels – and part of their backs were showing above the water line.

Elephants living here are Kalahari elephants, the largest in size of all known elephant populations. They have short and rather brittle tusks, perhaps due to calcium deficiency



The large numbers of elephants, each weighing up to five tonnes cause considerable damage to the woodlands of mahogany, teak and other hardwoods. In fact, the elephant concentration is so high throughout Chobe that culls have been considered, but are too controversial and have thus far been rejected.

During the dry season, the elephants stay close to the Chobe and Linyanti Rivers. When the rainy season starts they migrate 200 kilometres to the southeast stretch of the park. Their distribution zone

however outreaches the park and spreads to north-western Zimbabwe.

Cape Buffaloes and spectacular sunsets are among Chobe National Park's many attractions

Chobe is also home to thousands of hippos, although you can't see more than their eyes and ears above the river surface for much of the time. But get too close and they surface rapidly enough to upset a small boat.

More people are killed by hippos than by any other animal in Africa each year, even though hippos are strict vegetarians.

We saw hippos out of the water grazing on the island vegetation and small birds perching on their backs cleaning off parasites and leeches

Away from the river most of the trees were leafless and looked dead, although they will spring to life when the rains come. Notable were the bottle shaped baobabs, related to the boab trees found in WA's Kimberley.

The park is also a birder's paradise. There are large numbers of carmine bee-eaters in season. When the river is in flood spoonbills, ibis, various species of stork, duck and other waterfowl flock to the area.

Finally the sunset over the river in the dry season is spectacular. It is worth the trip to see it alone.

The retired 75-year old biologist and science teacher had spent the morning 'scribing' for the botanical component of an expedition in the Rawlinson Ranges in Central Australia mounted by the volunteer-based Desert Discovery organisation

Deserts are a familiar environment for Libby. 'I've done seven camel treks with Andrew Harper's Outback Camels and Desert Expeditions, mainly in the Simpson Desert,' she said. 'And this is my fourth Desert Discovery trip. I don't know why I love deserts so much when I'm a marine biologist! I think it's the open space, wilderness. Out here I can appreciate the immensity and beauty of Australia. And the nights, all the stars and constellations; I love hearing the Aboriginal stories of dark places between the stars.

It was on a Desert Discovery trip in

On the trail of adventure

2006 that Libby met cameleer John Wilkinson who now, at 91, is still exploring the desert and a keen member of the current expedition. 'Wilko' talked about being a cameleer and soon after I joined a trip,' she told me. 'I love going out with the camels. They walk silently, are so intelligent and being trained animals their damage to the pristine environment can be kept to a minimum. The camels carry the water, food and swags and we walk about 150 kilometres through the dunes, stopping to do pitfall trapping and other ecological work. We sleep out in swags under the stars. Sometimes it's so cold that you have to break the ice off the swag in the morning! You challenge yourself.

Challenge is something Libby clearly relishes, travelling alone in her Subaru Forester in a convoy of serious off-road vehicles. She carries minimal clothing and equipment. "I find there are lots of things we don't really need. I like to imagine what it was like for the early explorers.'

It's not just deserts that attract this adventurous spirit. She reels off her recent travel exploits all around the world - three trips to Antarctica, visiting the Arctic in winter to see the northern lights and sleeping in an ice-hotel, exploring Madagascar and catching a cargo ship to Thursday Island. Many of her Australian trips entail volunteering, including annual flora and fauna surveys in the Blue Mountains, weeding on Lord Howe Island, and regular bush regeneration in the Cumberland State Forest.

'My normal week is very full,' she said, in what was clearly a gross understatement.

'I visit my 97 year old friend on Mondays, and I volunteer for the University of Sydney Chancellor's Committee, mostly helping with fund-raising, and at the Australian Museum doing 'front of house' activities and tours. 

Cape Town - A European City in Africa

Take a boat trip into China's past hinese village of Zhouzhuang may not Zhouzhuang – pronounced "Jow Jong" and known as

THE QUAINT Chinese village of Zhouzhuang may not command the same attention as nearby Shanghai, but the town's very presence and preservation as the country's oldest water town provides today's visitors with the chance to delve into a historically significant past.

It is a lively city nestling under the shadow of Table Mountain and is set out to attract and entertain tourists. But there are enormous contrasts in wealth. The freeway from the airport is lined with 'informal settlements' a euphemism for shantytowns. However many tumbledown slum shacks have electricity and even satellite dishes. There have been massive

There have been massive changes in the 20 years since the end of apartheid but most blacks remain poor. Nonetheless there are a growing number of comfortably off blacks who have disposable income and enjoy spending it. It is rare to go into an upmarket bar in Cape Town without seeing at least a few black faces amongst the customers.

By South African standards Cape Town is a safe city, but most middle class houses are surrounded by razor wire and a warning that home invasions will be met with an armed response. Some enterprising youngsters make money by guarding your car when you leave it in the streets and the central business district is a no go area at night. On the other hand the restaurant and entertainment areas are safe to walk through.

The first thing a casual visitor to South Africa notices is that wine and restaurant prices cheap, even though they include 14 per cent Value Added Tax (VAT). This

can be partially explained by lower labour costs and the relatively high prices of the Australian dollar compared to the rand.

The best way to see the city is on one of the hop-on hop-off buses. And the premier tourist destination is Table Mountain.

The Mountain is often covered by a 'tablecloth' of cloud, but when it is clear the views are magnificent. The cable car rotates as it ascends giving everyone an opportunity to enjoy the panorama over the city.

The flat summit is covered in various walking trails, remnant vegetation and wildlife. Most interesting was the dassie, a rabbitsized furry animal surprisingly related to elephants.

The premier tourist destination is the Victoria and Alfred Waterfront development, formerly the port area and now a restaurant and souvenir Mecca. The city centre is compact and an intriguing mixture of Cape Dutch and Victorian architecture amongst modern office blocks.

The wine tour is a mustdo. Most of South Africa's premium wines are made not far from the Cape in Winelands, centred on Paarl and Stellenbosch. The tour took in three wineries. One, Vergendego, dated from 1773, featured historical tours and even duck walks in addition to wine tasting

tours and even duck walks in addition to wine tasting. Huguenots (protestant refugees from France) settled in c the Winelands and contrib-

uted much to the quality of food and wine. The Dutch East India Company, however, cleverly prevented the spread of the French tongue by intentionally settling the French apart from each

other. Another must-do tour is along the beautiful coast to the Cape of Good Hope. In parts of the National Park we had to keep doors and windows locked for fear of baboons. They have mastered the art of opening car doors

and snatching backpacks to search for food. Apparently they have learnt that bags of souvenirs contain nothing edible and leave them alone. On the way back, the tour

visited a colony of African penguins, getting close up and personal with elevated walkways.

Finally, the tour arrived at Kristenbosch Botanical Gardens, in a fantastic setting under Table Mountain. This is a highlight for gardeners as many Australian garden species, not to mention weeds, originated in South Africa. There were also some remnant yellowwood trees, which turned out to be members of the Podocarpus family and have been largely replaced in the Cape Province by faster-growing Australian eucalypts.

Cape Town is definitely worth a visit, although for tourists wanting the flavour of Africa it is atypical.

In the words of our guide: "Cape Town is a European city transported magically to South Africa."

Social connector grant to help Rockingham community

A NEW PROGRAM to help connect those who are socially isolated is being trialed at Bethanie Rockingham. Based on a Canadian program the Rockingham Social Connector Pilot Program will help those living in social isolation to develop a social network, contribute to and be part of the community.

The project will be implemented under a partnership between Bethanie and the City of Rockingham and will see funds from the grant used to train staff, coordinate the pilot program, monitor and evaluate its success.

There is no cost to the people who are assisted under the pilot, as this will be funded from the grant.

Staff at Bethanie Rockingham will be trained in the community connector role and will work with a number of people and families to rebuild a social network for the individual and to empower him/her to believe they can contribute and be part of the community. Once the network has been established the intensity of the worker's involvement will move to a maintenance role.

The pilot project will then be evaluated to determine its effectiveness in promoting social inclusion, reducing isolation and contributing to the health and wellbeing of the participants.

The criteria for participants to be involved are that they must live with in the City of Rockingham and be over 18 years of age.

Grants for the program came from the Disability Services Commission, and the Department for Communities.

Wendy Hibell, Regional Manager of Bethanie Community Metro South in Rockingham said she was excited to be involved in the pilot program which will involve up to five other agencies.

"I see first hand the benefits the grants provide to our community and this is just one example of service providers working together with various government departments to better the lives of people in our community, said Ms Hibell.





New walking program for people with dementia a winner for the heart and brain



Account-based pensions - the basics



RBS Morgans' David Pusey

YOUR DECISION about where and how your money is invested in superannuation could increase your income in a number of ways.

By rolling your superannuation money into a pension income stream at or after retirement, you can:

• generate more tax-effective income;

receive more generous Centrelink treatment;
have the flexibility to decide how your assets will be left to

your beneficiaries. Account-based pensions

are the most common form of superannuation pension used. **Overview**

Account-based pensions ('ABPs) replace allocated pensions from 1 July 2007, following the introduction of the "Simpler Super" rules, and are defined by the following.

• The pensioner has an individual account whereby payments are made at least annually.

• The pension cannot be commuted unless the minimum annual payment has been made or there is sufficient left in the account to pay the minimum. There is no maximum amount that can be paid out apart from whatever the account balance is at that time.
The minimum payment is calculated by multiplying the account balance by the percentage factor based on the pensioner's age at the time.
There is no tax on investment earnings within the pension fund.

• The pension fund is not liable for capital gains tax if investments are realised.

• Imputation credits received from franked dividends are fully returned as surplus to the pension fund.

Superannuation and Retirement

An account-based pension is specifically derived from superannuation money. The pension income is paid from the balance of the money remaining in the person's superannuation fund each year until it runs out. Payments can commence when the pensioner meets a condition of release to access benefits; that is, full retirement after reaching preservation age, ceasing an employment arrangement after age 60, inability to work due to invalidity, or reaching age 65 regardless of work status (for most people).

Transition to Retirement

Pensions Under the "Transition to Retirement" rules, a person who has reached preservation age can still access their superannuation in the form of a non-commutable income stream without having to meet the "full retirement" condition of release. A transition to retirement pension is effectively an account-based pension with restrictions; that is, lump sum withdrawals are not permitted. In addition, the individual can only draw up to a maximum of 10 per cent of the account balance (calculated at the start of each financial

year). The Bucket (Cash)

Strategy It has been a general practice for advisers to recommend their pensioner clients retain at least 18 months to two years worth of pension payments in cash. However, during this current market uncertainty pensioners should consider holding at least three to four years of income payments in cash. This should provide ample time to reflect on current markets and to ensure there is no need to draw down on capital to fund

to ensure there is no need to draw down on capital to fund superannuation pension payments. In particular, it avoids having to sell down quality assets during low market periods.

Centrelink Regardless of whether you are under or over pension age, as soon as a pension is commenced from superannuation, the value of the assets is assessed under Centrelink's Assets Test. However, super-

Assets Test. However, superannuation pensions receive favourable treatment under the Income Test. A "deductible amount" calculated in accordance with Centrelink rules reduces the actual amount counted as income for testing purposes. The deeming rules do not apply to these pensions. Estate Planning

On death of the pensioner the account-based pension can continue automatically to an eligible beneficiary if it had been established at commencement as a reversionary pension. Alternatively, the pension can be paid as a lump sum death benefit or as a discretionary death benefit pension to a nominated superannuation beneficiary or beneficiaries.

(Superannuation pension funds do not come under the scope of a Will. Death benefits can only be paid to a person's dependants as defined under superannuation law. Your adviser can provide more information on appropriate estate planning strategies.)



Creating enabling environments for people with dementia



ALZHEIMER'S Australia WA, in partnership with the University of Wollongong, has launched an Australian-first project aimed at translating research into best-practice design guidelines for dementia care environments including residential care and the home environment.

According to Mr Burton, General Manager at Alzheimer's Australia WA, the project aims to make a real difference to the quality and accessibility of built environments for people with dementia.

"People with dementia face a number of issues that influence how they see, feel and respond to the built environment," Mr Burton said.

"This could be due to their short term memory loss leading to disorientation in time and place as well as their impaired perception causing difficulty in defining objects and spaces."

"A well designed physical environ-

ment can play a major factor in assisting with these 'disabilities' of dementia."

Professor Fleming, Director of the NSW/ACT Dementia Training Study Centre based in the University of Wollongong, described the project as a bold initiative that will make it much easier for managers of health and aged care services to access the information they need to guide the development of built environments that help people with dementia lead full lives.

To support families to adapt their home the project provides a range of information, advice, ideas and education on how to make simple, low cost changes that will make a significant difference to the independence, safety and wellbeing of the person they care for.

The DEEP website – www.enablingenvironments.com.au has a room by room tour that shows many changes that can be made to the home. It also provides a forum to ask questions to an expert in dementia design as well as downloadable resources.

The project has a well stocked design library at Alzheimer's Australia WA headquarters in Shenton Park and a demonstration room showing assistive technology and design ideas.

The DEEP team will be running the first "Adapting Your Home" workshop for family carers and friends on 30 November and bookings can be made by contacting Alzheimer's Australia WA on 9388 2800.

Seniors have the same rights to health care as younger people

to health care as younger people. But the health care system discriminates against seniors in two ways.

Firstly health professionals often discourage older people from having expensive treatment on the grounds that they won't live to enjoy the benefit for long.

"Your rights are adversely impacted as you get older," she said. "There may be no intention to discriminate but assumptions are made on the basis of inadequate knowl-

edge. "Older is relative. It is a way of saying them, not us.

"Half of us will live to over 84, so denying treatment to a 70 year old means they miss out on 14 years or more of quality life.'

She said men with prostate cancer were often told they would have to live and die with the disease. But modern treatment could improve their well-being considerably.

Older women were often refused breast reconstruction surgery on the same basis. But this was denying their right to feel good about themselves sexually.

The health care profession often stereotyped older people.

'Baby boomers won't put up with this treatment," she said.

"It is important for doctors to speak at your level. Talking down will not result in suitable treatment.

Secondly older people are often excluded from trials. Therefore there is little evidence of the efficacy of treatment on older people. Nearly half the clinical trials Professor Gibson surveyed excluded participants on the basis of age.

"Half the time there is no justification for this," she said.

Because of this age discrimination evidence based treatment is not available. As a result older versions of 'flu vaccine were

given to older people because the modern vaccine had only been tested on the young.

"Do younger people have more right to resources? Is it more important to save a life at 20 than 60?" she asked.

Women live longer than men but no one values a female life more than a male, she said

However she said it was reasonable not to carry out heroic treatment on people in the 90s or older.

Most problems are not about the use of resources. Some older people stay longer in hospital than younger, but only 92 of 617 studies showed any difference and in 32 studies the difference was less than five per cent.

'Younger people cost the health system more for the same disease. There is more image taking, more testing and more expensive prostheses are used for younger patients. On the other hand older people require more nursing.'

Follow up radiotherapy after cancer treatment is less often carried out on older people in Australia. But this doesn't happen in US because Medicare cuts in at 65 and radiotherapy is funded.

She said most people's ideas about seniors were based on their grandparents. In the 1950s female life expectancy was 69 and men only 65.

Health professionals trained in the 70s have the same perception.

"The reality is that your grandparents are probably going to live for several years. Concepts of healthy, positive, productive ageing are not yet worked into the system.

Professor Gibson called for a fair go for seniors

"Treatment should be an individual choice. More people are living longer and most are not keen to die soon," she said.



OSTEOPOROSIS is sometimes confused with the term osteoarthritis: sometimes they both present simultaneously, however each is very different.

Osteoporosis is a condition in which the bones become fragile and brittle, leading to a higher risk of fracture (breaks or cracks) than in normal bone. Osteoarthritis is a term that refers to the wear and tear of the cartilage which covers the bones at joints.

Osteoporosis occurs when bone loses minerals, such as calcium, more quickly than the

body can replace them, leading to a loss of bone thickness (bone mass or density). As a result, bones become thinner and less dense, so that even a minor bump or fall can cause a fracture of the bone.

Any bone can be affected by osteoporosis, but the most common sites are the bones in the hip, spine, wrist, ribs, pelvis and upper arm. Osteoporosis usually has no sign or symptoms until a fracture occurs this is why it is often called the 'silent disease'

Fractures due to osteoporosis (osteoporotic fractures) can lead to changes in posture (stooping posture), muscle weakness, loss of height and bone deformity of the spine. Fractures can lead to chronic pain, disability, loss of independence and

The cascade effect Unfortunately 50 per cent of people with one fracture due to osteoporosis will have another. The risk of future fractures rises with each new fracture. The 'cascade effect' means

that women whom have suffered a fracture in their spine are more than four times more likely to have another fracture within the next year, compared to women who have never had an osteoporotic fracture. People who have two or

more osteoporotic fractures are up to nine times more likely to have another fracture, rising to 11 times greater risk for people who have had three or more fractures, compared to someone who has not had one. One in two women and one

in three men aged more than 60

years will have an osteoporotic fracture in Australia.

Two thirds of fractures of the spine are not identified or treated, even though they cause most pain and loss of independence. Sometimes people iust consider their pains and stooped posture to be due to old age and arthritis. However for many people, osteopororotic fractures can be prevented, or at least your risk of having fractures can be reduced.

Who gets osteoporosis?

Osteoporosis affects men and women. Women are at a greater risk of developing osteoporosis than men, mainly due to the rapid decline in oestrogen levels after menopause. Oestrogen is an important hormone for maintaining healthy bones. When oestrogen levels decrease, the bones lose calcium at a much faster rate.

BreastScreen WA says screening mammograms do not cure cancer or prevent cancer from developing in the future, nor are they 100 per cent accurate. But in women aged 50 to 69 years. screening mammography

is the best way of detecting unsuspected cancer at an

mortality from breast cancer. Women aged 40 to 49 and 70 years or over, who have no breast symptoms, are also eligible for free screening.

Regular screening mammograms every two years helps detect any unusual changes at an early stage.

With pap smears, after a woman turns 70, a doctor may advise there is no longer a need to have one if previous tests were normal.

But this this is an individual decision. An American study suggests with women having a longer life expectancy, they should consider continuing regular pap smears beyond 70.



WITH THE arrival of spring, snakes are posing a greater threat to pets as the warmer weather and dryer conditions put an end to

their winter hibernation. Australia's peak veterinary body, the Australian Veterinary Association (AVA) is urging pet owners to take precautions to precat being bitten. "Symptoms can vary with different snakes but sudden onset of seizures, vomiting, weakness in the limbs and inability to move may be observed. Soon after the symptoms occur, the animal may collapse with severely laboured breathing," Dr Neck said.

Dr David Neck, President of AVA's small animal special interest group said that snakes tend to be their most active towards the end of the day.

"Snake bites tend to occur in the late afternoon or early evening. Snakes also tend to be attracted to rodents and rubbish to hide under.

"Dog owners should avoid snake prone areas, particularly if they are walking their dog at the end of the day. Snakes can also venture into backyards and over the spring and summer months, even city dogs and cats can be at risk

Dr Neck said it is important for pet owners to be aware of the signs of a snake bite as owners may not actually see their dog or

Although snake bites can be deadly, rapid treatment with the appropriate antivenom can be very effective if done quickly.

"If you spot any of these symptoms in your pet, quickly call the nearest veterinarian so that they can be prepared for your arrival at the veterinary hospital with the right treatment, he said.

Men's Sheds sharing



SHARING the Knowledge was the theme of the WA Men's Shed conference co-hosted by the Mosman Park and Fremantle Men's Sheds and held at the new Mosman Park Community Men's Shed on 3 and 4 October.

The conference was opened by the Governor of WA, Malcolm McCusker, patron of the WA Men's Shed Association, which organised the conference.

Representatives of the four major political parties, Liberal, WA Nationals, Labor and Greens attended and all added their support to the concept of men's sheds.

The contribution that the sheds make to the well-being of men and to the wider community was emphasised by several speakers, including Julian Krieg from Re-gional Men's Health, Professor Barry Golding from the University of Ballarat and David Helmers from the Australian Men's Shed Association.

There were tips on how to establish and sustain a shed, where to obtain funding, safety and duty of care, plus insurance.

Several challenging topics were also tackled including, engaging schools, mentoring youth, engag-ing younger men, the role of wom-

en and men's health.

Presentations were made by representatives from sheds from around the state including those located in Bridgetown, Joondalup, Narrogin, Mosman Park, Donnybrook, Toodyay, Fremantle, Kalamunda, Subiaco, Esperance and Mukinbudin, which organised the first WA conference in 2009.

The 170 delegates were also able to obtain information from a trade exhibition plus displays from several sheds.

Men's Sheds were first established in Australia about 20 years ago, but are now in several other countries, in particular, Ireland and New Zealand

There are more than 130 sheds in WA that are either already operating or being planned.





Heavy penalties for Self Managed Superannuation Trustees

The Self Managed Super Handbook Merennisten fas for Self Managed Superannustion Funds in plain English Former Former

TRUSTEES Pay the Price for Noncompliance with Superannuation Law With the rise in popularity of Self Managed Superannuation Funds (SMSFs), trustees are being caught out with massive penalties for non-compliance with the law.

"The problem," says Monica Rule, "is that many trustees have a complete lack of knowledge about their responsibilities and the superannuation law."

Monica Rule has more than 16 years experience in the superannuation industry dealing with accountants, auditors, and fund trustees. She comes across non-complying funds on a daily basis. "Non-compliance is a serious issue because the fund could potentially lose half its assets, wiping out the trustees' dream of a happy retirement" says Monica.

As trustees have total control of their SMSFs, the biggest area of non-compliance is loans made by the SMSF to members. Not only do the loans need to be repaid, but they need to be repaid with interest at commercial rates. "Many trustees think that because they have control of the SMSF that they can use funds in the SMSF as additional funds for their immediate needs," says Monica. "The principle behind an SMSF is that it is for a trustee's retirement and funds and assets within the fund have to be 'quarantined' away from day-to-day expenses." "I have seen many trustees get into trouble financially because they have borrowed money from their SMSF thinking that they could borrow this money with no interest," says Monica.

Help for trustees, however, is at hand.

Monica has written a book "The Self Managed Super Handbook – Superannuation Law for Self Managed Superannuation Funds in Plain English", to help Trustees comply with the Superannuation Law. The book is unique because it only deals with compliance with the law. "I don't go into investment strategies like other books on SMSFs do, my main concern is that trustees protect their fund's assets by complying with the law," says Monica. The book is written in plain English and provides links to Taxation Office documents and case law. Monica says, "The easiest way for trustees to learn is to look at case studies to see how the law applies to real-life situations. My book is aimed at giving vital compliance information to trustees without being too 'heavy'.

While trustees may feel that with the expert advice of their SMSF advisor or accountant is sufficient Monica disagrees. "It's very important that trustees have some understanding of their obligations," says Monica. "At the end of the day, they are the ones held accountable by the Taxation Office not their accountant. At the very least they should have a working knowledge of their obligations so that they can make informed choices based on the advice of their advisors," says Monica.


